






The facts in 2023 - Common Sense Media <u>"Teens and</u> <u>Pornography,"</u>

Percent of teen respondents who have seen online pornography, by age:



12 is the average age when children first consumed pornography.










More than half of teen respondents said they had seen violent and/or aggressive pornography, including media that depicts what appears to be rape, choking, or someone in pain. Many teen respondents believed online pornography gives helpful information about sex, but fewer thought it accurately shows sex.


Teen who have seen ...

Only **1** in **3** said they had seen pornography that includes someone asking for consent before engaging in sexual activity.


Less than half of teen respondents had discussed pornography with a trusted adult.





Cis* boy respondents were more likely to view pornography on purpose compared to cis girls.

* Cis refers to a person whose gender identity aligns with those typically associated with the sex assigned to them at birth.

About Sparx

Sparx puts every student's education experience at the heart of everything they do.

Sparx is created first and foremost to help students learn maths in a way that works for them.

Using the perfect mix of engaging maths content, bitesize tutorial videos and written workbook tasks, Sparx supports students' independent learning. Find out more at sparx.co.uk

What is Sparx?

Each week your maths homework will be set for you to complete on Sparx.

This homework will be personalised to you, which means the questions will be just the right difficulty for you.

Which homework type do I do?

Each week you will see three sections of questions that you can select from the sidebar.

Compulsory

You must correctly answer all of these questions before your hand-in deadline.

You can choose whether or not to do this. It's only half as long as your Compulsory homework but is great for helping you feel more confident with everything you've learnt in maths.

Optional

Target

You can choose whether or not to do this. It contains up to 6 questions and will advance your maths skills even further. It is slightly trickier than Compulsory and Optional homework.


Times tables practice

How do I do my Sparx Homework?

You will need to click on the white bar that says "Homework due..." to expand your most recent compulsory homework.

You will then see a list of tasks which you can click on to open them.

We'll go through this in the practice later.



Bookwork Checks

Sparx will check whether you are writing down your answers.

In a Bookwork check you will have to input the answer that you wrote down for a particular bookwork code, even if you got the answer wrong so it is important to make sure you write down all of your workings neatly and clearly.



Bookwork

Your book work should look something like this.

Remember, for every question you must **write down** the bookwork code and the answer you gave.




What is XP?

XP (Sparx Experience Points) are how you are rewarded for completing homework.

You can earn XP by completing homework tasks. You also get about twice as much XP for completing Optional and Target homework tasks!

The amount of XP you have is shown at the top right of the page.




How do I know when my homework is finished?

Your homework is finished when you have answered every question **correctly** in your compulsory homework.

Every task will be green and say "Completed" next to it.

You can then choose to move on to Optional and Target homework. To do this, you will need to click on the relevant box on the lefthand side and follow the same process as for Compulsory homework.



And finally ..

It is really important that your homework is yours and yours alone.

Sparx needs to create homework that is right for you and that helps you to get better at Maths.

If someone else does it for you or tells you the answers without you having worked them out for yourself, you will probably get homework that is too hard for you! VICTORIA EST 1852



Sixth Form Entry

Grade point average of **5.5** at GCSE recommended for a three A Level programme

Grade point average of **4.8** minimum required for entry in to Sixth Form, with those between 4.8 and 5.5 considered on individual merit, with possible direction towards appropriate subject combinations (including vocational at consortium schools)

Level 4 in both English (Literature OR Language) and Mathematics GCSE

N.B. Separate entry requirements exist for some subjects (e.g. A Level Mathematics) – full details in the subject options guide
